His sketches make me believe mind is the centre of creativity, and will is the power that guides this creative; if people use this combination then whether you are disabled or not you will succeed. This year his sketches were our gifts to all our guests.

Apart from joyful learning, celebration of diversity, bridging gaps, identifying talent and encouraging volunteerism, Anjali festival is also playing another important role. About Swabhiman

Swabhiman's Vision is to create an equal society. Its main activities are Advocacy, Information Dissemination, Research, Documentation and Networking.

The need for an independent organization capable of providing information relating to any aspect of disability was the subject of discussion among activists in this field for many years. It was in response to this that Disability Information and Resource Centre, Swabhiman, came up in 2001. Subsequently it has evolved to become the lead organization in advocacy and cross-disability endeavors. Anjali started as an inclusive education project of Swabhiman.

Swabhiman's Vision is to create an equal society. Its main activities are Advocacy, Information Dissemination, Research & Documentation; and

Networking. It specializes in conducting training programs, hosting events, conducting access audits and organizing awareness programs. Ongoing projects include (i) Project Addhyayan (ii) Project Swabalamban (iii) Project YLTP and (iv) Project Anjali. Anjali is the inclusive education project of Swabhiman.

BACKGROUND

From project Anjali to Anjali International Children's Festival, a dream has grown large to encompass children from all over India, and beyond, breaking all man made barriers. It commenced as a five-year

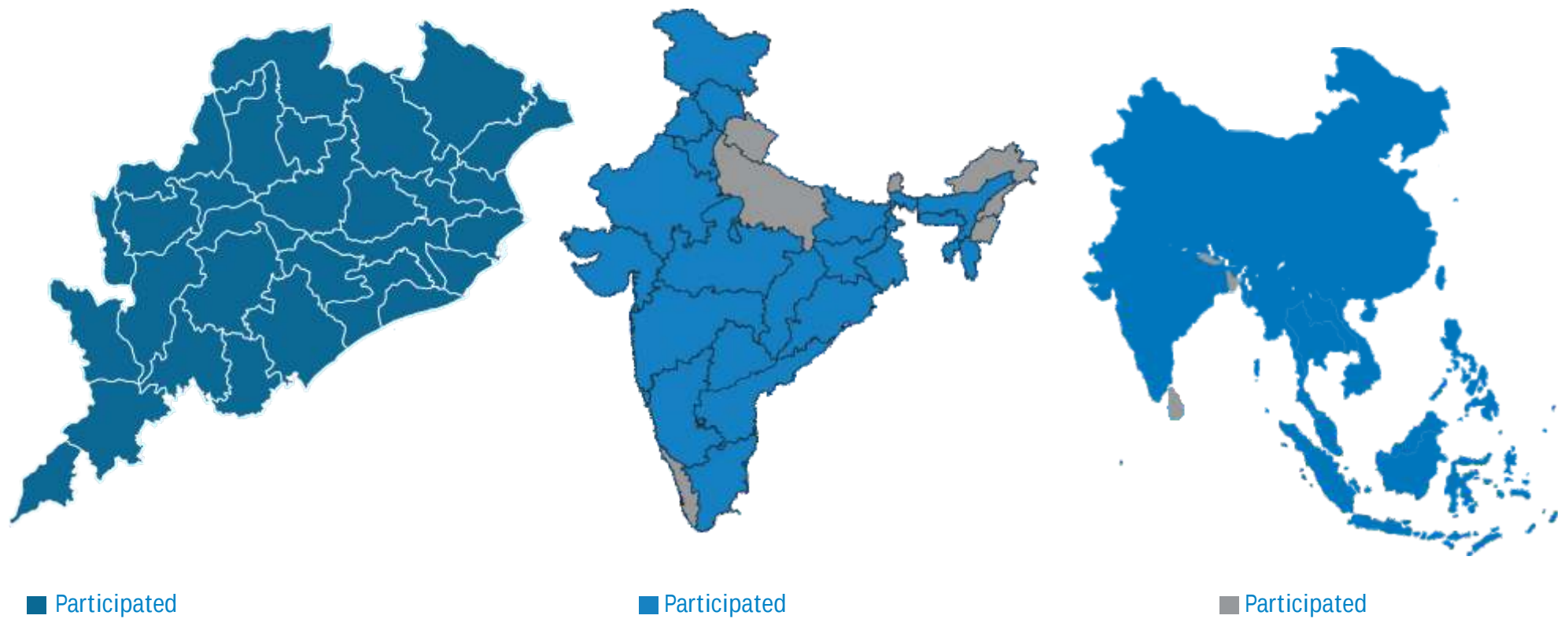
demonstration project, in 2001, to focus on physically and sensory challenged children. The avid interest of mainstream school students saw it transforming into an inclusive children festival in 2003 and finally the only national children festival in 2004. On the one hand it is an effort to empower children who had been stigmatized and oppressed so they may participate fully in society and on the other hand it focuses on bridging gaps by enabling disabled and non-disabled children discover each other in four days camp. It is the ONLY international children festival in India. In its 13 years journey it has reached over 30000 children and helped many disabled students to successfully complete courses, obtain jobs and thus get opportunities. Anjali asserts 'SAY YES TO ALL CHILDREN.'

- ✖ To restore fun filled childhood.

FESTIVAL OBJECTIVES

- ✖ Encourage SSA schools to educate children with disabilities.

2014 Festival Highlights

800 participants (children, escorts and volunteers) from 30 districts of the state, 17 states of India and neighboring country Nepal were present in the camp for 4 days.



The thirteenth edition of the country's only international children's festival, Anjali, commenced on 11th November 2014 at Adivasi Exhibition Grounds, in Unit I, Bhubaneswar and continued till

14th November. Hundreds of differently abled children accompanied by students of mainstream schools sang and danced in the Carnival of Love which was the

first event of the 13th National Anjali Children's Festival; and was flagged off by Swamiji, Bollywood actor Sabyasachi Mishra and Adwaita Gadanayak .

In the august presence of Swami Shuddhananda Giri, President of Prajnana Mission, Chief Minister of Odisha Naveen Patnaik

inaugurated the camp along with Minister Women and Child Development department, Usha Devi, Chief Secretary G. C. Pati and member OSCPCR Rajendra Meher. With Anjali Award for Commitment Anjali Pariwar recognized Shri S.N. Girish. IAS, who is presently serving as the Managing Director of Odisha Mining Corporation, Bhubaneswar for his contribution towards empowering persons with disabilities in all capacities in which he had served previously. 800 participants (children, escorts and volunteers) from 30 districts of the state, 17 states of India and neighboring country Nepal were



present in the camp for 4 days. 12 workshops (Art, Balloon Sculpture, Cartooning, Creative Dance, First Aid, Magic, Modern Dance, Music, Paper Craft, Paper Quilling, Pottery and Terracotta and Ventriloquism) were conducted. Padmashree Sudarshan Patnaik created sand sculpture. On 14th November Anjali Camp paid tribute to Chacha Nehru on his 125th birthday. With 125 children offering rose buds to a huge sand potrait of Pandit Neheru. 1700 students from 17 schools visited the camp. 150 students participated in the inter school competitions. A total of 160 volunteers and 52 service providers coordinated the event.

Swacch Anjali – Swacch Bharat

Drawing inspiration from PM Narendra Modi's call for mass participation in the Swachh Bharat mission, volunteers ensured Swachh Anjali in the camp.



With nearly 1000 children, their escorts and volunteers staying in the camp, over 2000 people visiting everyday, keeping the Adivasi ground clean was a real challenge. The

volunteers of Anjali took upon the challenge drawing inspiration from PM Narendra Modi's call for mass participation in the Swachh Bharat mission. The organizers of the festival

decided to start their own Swachh Anjali mission.

“When so many people come together especially children there is bound to be waste but the grounds must remain clean, we are responsible for that. More importantly if we follow the PM's message here then the children who are participating will also understand the importance of cleanliness,” stated Asit Kumar Behera a senior coordinator.

The sanitation department comprised of only 5 volunteers but they ensured that four large waste disposal containers were onsite along with pits for biodegradable waste. The volunteers cleaned up the route of the Carnival of Love procession and had a schedule for patrolling the camp for waste collection. “The four volunteers working with me were from KISS. They worked ceaselessly for the all the camp days,” said Partha Sarathi Samal coordinator of the sanitation department, who had taken leave from



office to volunteer in Anjali. Padmashree Sudarshan Patnaik and his students created a huge sand art on the Swachh Bharat campaign.

KIIT School of Sculpture under the guidance of Senior Sculpture Adwaita Gadanayak created a huge float on the Swachh Bharat campaign during carnival. It moved through the street of Bhubaneswar along with merry making children.



Anjali Award 2014

Anjali awards intend to identify people those who have discovered doors where others saw walls.



Anjali awards intend to identify people who have set out to take a second look to what was available and explore different ways of making things better. Anjali has three awards – Anjali Award for Bravery, Anjali Award for Service and Anjali Award for Commitment.

Anjali Award for Bravery is given in the recognition of exemplary achievements on the part of the person with disability or parents of a child who did not fall down on facing challenges but carved out a niche by the sheer dint of will. Some previous recipients are Mr. Sambit

Dash, Miss Ankita Panda & Panda Family, Mr. Kartik Chandra Pandab, Mr. Rajkishore Ghatkia, Ms. Indira Pattnaik and Late Mr. Ashok Hans. Anjali Award for Service is given in the recognition of excellent work done for the disability sector by an individual or an NGO, whose drive and creative problem solving abilities have brought about significant changes in the world of people with disabilities. 2014 ANJALI AWARD FOR COMMITMENT

It was conferred on Shri S. N. Girish, IAS. He is presently the managing director of OMC (Odisha Mining Corporation). A man with an extremely generous heart Shri Girish S.N is strong willed and determined. He leaves no stone unturned to improve the lives of

people. For many, he is the only ray of hope. 'Where there is a will there is a way', is that maxim which he follows.

Never has a person with disability returned empty handed from his office. He has always given his time, attention and all possible assistance. He launched an innovative project named Mission Netrotsav in Dhenkanal district for detection and correction of visual impairment of pre-school, school and out of school children. All the children of the district were examined and eye-related services provided. Katak district received the best District Award from Hon'ble President of India in the category of providing comprehensive rehabilitation and empowerment measures to persons with disabilities under his able guidance. During General Election – 2014, Katak district became the only district to provide ramps, wheel chairs and volunteers in all the booths for facilitating voters with disability; and launched a sensitization and awareness drive due to which more than 90% of the disabled turned up for voting.

Anjali Scholarships 2014-15

Over 100 college going students with disabilities have been supported till date with scholarships.

Carnival of Love

The carnival generates massive visibility through one single event by setting the whole city abuzz.



13th Anjali Children's Festival kick started with a huge, colorful, musical and thumping carnival that saw the city's streets thronging with children from all across the nation along with a

picturesque float, several groups of folk artists, and colorful standees. Swami Shuddhananda Giri, President of Prajnana Mission, actor Sabyasachi, Dr. Sruti Mohapatra flagged off the

carnival with Adwaita Gadnayak the designer of the float. Nearly 3000 children and adults from various parts of the country took to the streets donning colorful costumes, accessories and masks as the sound of trumpets and drumbeats echoed in the background. Children with painted faces, in dazzling dresses, jumping tigers, dancing warriors and waving fairies gave an illusion of a passing train of colors from a distance. It was a collage of children with various abilities (as well as disabilities) draped in distinct themes. The decorated float from KIIT designed by Adwaita Gadnayak, the renowned sculptor of Odisha was a big attraction. The float displayed the theme of Anjali 2015 "Solidarity and Brotherhood". It also displayed "Swachh Bharat" abhiyan.

Folk dance groups added to the color and rhythm of the carnival. Maa Sarala Folk Dance from Kanakpur, Jagatsinghpur, Laudi Nrutya from Katak, Ghanta Patua from Chhendipada in Anugul, Sahi Jata from Puri, Jodi Sankha from Ganjam, Singha Baja from Bolangir, Tall Ghoda Nacha from Puri, Ghoda Nacha and Bagha Nacha from Ganjam



and Punjabi Dhol from Bhubaneswar were in the carnival.

Cine actor Sabyasachi said "it is a grand carnival and the nation should thank leader like Sruti, who took initiative to begin such innovative tasks for upliftment of the underprivileged."

"We are very happy and excited. It's hot but we do not mind waiting for the carnival to start" said the little girls of Mother's Public School in chorus.

“It is safe that we have a rickshaw to carry us, but I desperately want to climb down and join the carnival,” said an excited Ashok from Gwalior who has CP and mild MR.

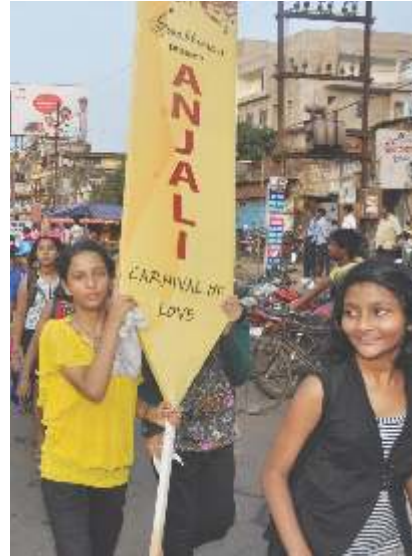
“Disabled people are generally termed as the invisible minority. The carnival generates massive visibility through

one single event. It sets the whole city abuzz. It lets people know that we disabled people are very much visible” stated Sruti Mohapatra while referring to the importance of the carnival. “We are all in costumes, no one can tell whether you are disabled or otherwise. Any discrimination disappears.” Partha Sarathi Samal, who has served

as an Anjali volunteer for 6 years, said “We have ensured that 2 buses travel with the carnival, one at the back and one joins midway. They are available for any of the participants who feel unwell or grow tired. There are 4 water points along the route; and we have volunteers on bikes who provide water,

first aid and any help if required,” while describing the measures taken to ensure the safety and well being of the carnival's participants. Volunteer Deepa who since past five years takes leave from hospital, provided first aid support.









Sabyasachi Mishra

Ollywood actor Sabyasachi Mishra Speaks to Ritushree Patra about Anjali.

Q: What challenges did you face while portraying the character of a differently abled person in “Kenu Duniya Ru Asila Bandhu?”

A: As an actor we are expected to do justice to the character we are given. Hence I had to spend time with people having a similar disability. In the schedule of 30-40 days I realized how difficult it is to spend life with such incompleteness. Hence I feel they are much stronger than us.

Q: How long has your association been with Anjali?

A: I have been associated with Anjali for many years. In fact I love this festival.

Q: Which was the best part of today's Carnival of Love?

A: The smiles that these children had on their face was the best part for me. All these children who struggle for even day to day chores get this wonderful occasion to be happy, and that is a priceless possession. The love and affection they showered on me made me feel like I am their elder brother.

Q: Your message to society?

A: A message for children's day. Keep the child within you alive. By doing so one would be away from all the complications and corruption in life.

With wheel chairs spinning at 150 kms/hour, faster than an accomplished ballet dancer's spin, watching the dance performances was an experience beyond ordinary.



12 artists, either wheel chair users or deaf, performed Sufi dance, Bharatnatyam, yoga, Manipuri martial arts and modern dance. Under the adroit guidance of dancer and

choreographer Guru Syed Salauddin Pasha this troupe has about 10,000 performances to its credit across India and the globe. They spell bounded the audience on the inaugural evening.



They performed the mystical Sufi dance and Bharatanatyam like seasoned dancers. They are hundred times more able than any normal person said Anusaya Das a senior citizen with tears in her eyes.

Performances are a combination of heart and soul and the magic lies in the fire generated by the wheels said Syed Pasha, founder and artistic director of Ability Unlimited who also hosted the event. Boys performed on wheelchairs with group of six girls, three of them hearing impaired, accompanying them



with Bharatnatyam steps. Two items had live songs, with sibling's Nagina and Zahir who are both visually impaired, singing along the dance item. Visitors to Adivasi Ground were spell bound by a performance by the talented artists of Ability Unlimited Foundation here on Tuesday.

When Sir Amitabh Bachhan asked me if I am tired after the performance abroad I smiled and said it was just a warm up said Gulshan Kumar, Guinness World Book record holder and the lead performer of the group.

Inauguration

Inaugurating the 13th Anjali National Children's Festival, Chief Minister Mr. Naveen Patnaik said that the world has now recognized that realization of children's rights is essential for world peace. He stressed on giving children the right environment for their proper all round growth, observing that the special care should be extended to the special children.

"Every child has a right to live with absolute happiness steadily learning things and realizing his or her potential. We must apply all our resources for a better childhood for our

children. We also have a special responsibility towards our special children. We will do everything to support our special children with special needs." he said.

Lauding the organizer of the festival Swabhiman Dr. Sruti Mohapatra, Mr. Patnaik said "she has been tirelessly working for the cause of disability and children for the past several years and Odisha is proud of her. It is because of her sincere efforts that more than 25,000 children of as many as 24 states are now taking part in the Anjali festival."

Atmospheric Design

Volunteerism being the core of Anjali, atmospheric design was incorporated to involve art college students.



This activity was conceptualized by Vijayant Dash in 2010 to involve students from city's art colleges. This year seven groups comprising 55 students from B.K.College of Fine Arts

and Utkal University of Culture from Bhubaneswar enacted seven artworks in the designate areas in the camp. The artworks reflected the theme 'Solidarity and Brotherhood.' The

names of various artworks were Garland (Team Leader - Nirod Nalini Behera), Unity is Strength; and Judgment Day (Team Leader - Aniruddha Sahoo), Whisker Green (Team Leader – Susanta Kumar Dalei), Green World (Team

Leader Sumitra Choudhury), Unity is Power (Team Leader - Sushil Kumar Mallick), All in One – One in All (Team Leader - Sanjulata Sahoo) and Save the Girl Child (Team Leader - Shivadas Sengupta).



Solidarity Land

The fantasy land depicts the theme of the festival through sculptures, artwork, light and sound.



Solidarity is unity as of a group or class, which produces or is based on unities of interests, objectives, standards, and sympathies. It refers to the ties in a society that bind people

together as one. Based on this founder Dr. Sruti Mohapatra wanted to sensitize all the children, and the concept was translated to an artwork by artist Kailash Das and his team.

At the centre was a huge model of planet earth supported by two disabled and two non-disabled children. The solidarity land had sculptures and wall painting to express solidarity and brotherhood through a series of artworks – first was 'peace across borders' depicting Kailash Satyarthi and Malala Yusufzai, the nobel prize winners from India and Pakistan respectively; second was 'many paths-one god' showing people from different religions embracing each other; third was 'man and nature' showing nature-human interaction and last was

'inclusive world,' where disabled and non-disabled children were studying and playing together.



Pandit Godabarish Workshops

The workshops are learning experience for the children without the constraints of a classroom. Workshops are models of joyful and alternate methods of learning.



Paper Craft Workshop

It was conducted by ArunPhatak. "I am having a great time teaching in Anjali. I came here in the maiden year 2001. Children love to play with paper and create. Paper is a relatively inexpensive medium, readily available, and easier to work with than the more complicated media."

Volunteer Sibarchana Jena reported that there were 87 students over the three days. "Both the differently abled and general students had the same eagerness to create. They learnt paper hangings, paper flowers, bouquets and animals. It's my pleasure to be here and teaching and entertaining children."

Balloon Sculpture Workshop

It was conducted by expert Puyal Ganesh from Chennai. "Children were enthusiastic. Showed them what they can do with the balloons. Handling is what they learnt on the first day, on second day kids were enthusiastic and ever ready to do sculpting themselves. Some did on their own. Some needed guidance. And some were fast too. Language problem was overcome with the help of volunteer."

Volunteer Ansuman Nanda reported that there were altogether 64 participant children in the workshop over three days. Deaf students Neel, Karan and Manju were appreciated by Puyel sir for their deft fingers and artistic abilities. Several art works like head gears, flowers, animals etc. were taught to participants. The balloon headgear were very popular among children.





Creative Dance Workshop

It was conducted by resource persons Manju Verma and Reetu Jain from Delhi. "It was a pleasure overall to work with these children. They told us at the end of the workshop that they were happy and enjoyed using different parts of the body, learning body rhythmic patterns of a dance. They also said they learnt story telling & putting movements to the stories. Finally, they are also excited about the choreography they would perform at

the cultural program in the evening."

Volunteer Sujata Konhor reported that there were 12 students in the workshop. "Children with disabilities and those without any coordinated very well with each other. I learnt that the children with disabilities can face every situation in their life without any sadness. I am grateful to Anjali family which gives a lot of joy, happiness in my life and I am happy to be a part of this sweet family."

Modern Dance Workshop

It was conducted by Master Harihar Deo. "Dance comes from the heart and not from training. These children are naturally gifted. My disability does not impact my dancing. I was a student first and today a resource person. I have choreographed on the track 'Jhume Ki Raat' from the movie 'Kick'. The children and their escorts are enjoying to the fullest."

Volunteer Samikhya Patra reported that there were 30 students in the modern art dance workshop. It was really a treat to the eyes, seeing the kids move their steps so happily. In second day they practiced the tune of 'Indiawale' from the movie 'Happy New Year'. Children with and without disabilities synchronised step very beautifully.





Music Workshop

It Was conducted by Guru Prasanta Jena. They were taught an song “Aji Subha Lagana” (Today is an auspicious moment). Some participants faced language problem as they came from different parts of India and could not understand Odia. Volunteers explained the meaning and all participants enjoyed singing to the tunes of Prasanta sir. On the second day, children sang to the accompaniment of Dholak, Keyboard and harmonium



and pad.

Volunteer Saptaparna Das reported that there were 25 participants. “Overall, it was a great experience seeing the regular school and the differently abled children mingle with each other and sing so well as a group.” The valedictory day presentation saw a long applause after the melodious rendering by participants of Music Workshop.

Fine Art Workshop

It was conducted by Rabi Narayan Rath. “I instructed them to make a drawing from their own memory to known the skill and creativity among all. Most of them have drawn landscape painting and some of them drawn figurative work. As per their requirement I have suggested as well as demonstrated also. On second and third day I demonstrated landscape painting and animal figures. I have given freedom to some children to work from their own and I have given

tips at the time of coloring. All painted in pleasant mood.”

Volunteer Madhusmitsa Swain reported that a total of 77 children participated over 3 days. “Some children took the freedom to work from their imagination and some followed sir. Sir gave them freedom to draw and color. Lastly I want to say one thing it was very enjoyable and memorable moment in my life. I am very happy to have joined the Anjali camp and also the workshop.”





Cartooning Workshop

It was conducted by famous Odia cartoonist Kamala Kanta Rath. "We started with simple drawings using different shapes. Then they were taught to draw cartoons using numbers. Participants drew cartoon turtle, swan, human face, birds and animals using numbers. Further they were taught to make simple cartoon expressions. Overall the participants were very talented."

Volunteer Smruti Paradarshita reported



that a total of 46 students participated in cartooning workshop. Mr. K. K. Rath taught them to draw cartoons using alphabets, lines and numbers. Children were quite happy doing the work. All the works they did in these three days, the materials they were using, were returned to them. A strong request came from many escorts to conduct a workshop for them and a cartooning competition.

Magic Workshop

It was conducted by Magician Sudhansu Das. "I am having a great time teaching students who are willing to learn the art of magic. The students are diverse. Some from different parts of India and some from Nepal and they all have the urge and interest in magic. Magic happens rarely in life. But for these spirited kids who are taking part in this festival every moment here is magic and that is what makes them believe that no matter how far off their dreams may seem now they will achieve it one day because magic happens if you want to make it happen

in real life and of course in Anjali."

Volunteer Siddhanth Giri reported that there were 67 students over the three days. "Both the differently abled and general students had the same eagerness to acquire all minute details of all tricks. The teacher was also very co-operative. They learnt magic from rope, cards, bottle, paper, bangles and coin. It's my pleasure to be here and teaching and entertaining children. Visiting school students were entertained by the workshop participants.





First Aid Workshop

It was conducted by Dr. Bikash Kumar Prasad. "The training given on first-aid with examples, wounds & bleeding and forearm fracture management. Each of the special children practiced before me. Mr. Taraprasad Patnaik, a first aider, assisted. On the second day, management of bleeding from nose, forehead and scalp; transportation by hand seat carry & blanket lifting was taught. In addition to this first-aid management of dog bite, snake bite, insect sting and foreign body in the



eyes, nose & ear was taught. 5 children were very much interested in the class and their performance was very good. The parents and teachers also participated actively in the workshop. Our first-aid trainee from previous years, Mr. Firoz Khan was a volunteer this year."

Volunteer Harapriya Nayak reported that there were a total of 18 children and 37 parents/teachers present in the first-aid workshop. "In my opinion the students and parents had keen interest to learn first-aid.

Paper Quilling and Paper Jewelry Workshop

It was conducted by Trevor Pascal Pereira from Mumbai. "I have done lots of workshops, but felt different. It was a very different experience. There was one kid who could not speak nor hear, but was very creative and first it was very difficult for me to make him understand, but then I learnt to communicate. The children enjoyed

the workshop and all of them wore those paper earrings that they made on the last day. "

Volunteer Swagatika Sahoo reported that there were 92 students over the three days. "It was a fascinating workshop. Our resource person was very involved with the participants. We got paper earrings."





Ventriloquism Workshop

It was conducted by Magician and ventriloquist Prabir Kumar Das from Kolkata. "First day we made the doll, second day we practiced talking and third day we practiced more. All students are brilliant and good. Three participants were selected for the performance in the evening."

Volunteer A. K. P Akshita reported that there were 26 children in the workshop. "They followed the



instructions of the resource person very keenly. I enjoyed working with them by helping them with their materials. Participants were enthusiastic in making the puppets. It was a great experience working with them. I enjoyed and learnt many things." Ventriloquism is an act of stagecraft in which a person changes his or her voice so that it appears that the voice is coming from elsewhere, usually a puppet.

Pottery and Terracotta Workshop

It was conducted by National Awardee Debraj Sahoo and Tarun Tapan Sahoo. In pottery workshop children learnt using the potters wheel. They made small diyas, bowls, plates and cups. In terracotta they learnt to make birds, toys, fish, peacock, tree with snake etc.

Volunteer Nimai Charan Swain reported that there were a total of 97 students over the four days in the workshop. "Before working in this I was not so

much interested to be in this workshop. But after looking at the making of different things I felt very happy and enjoyed being with the resource persons and the children." Pottery also refers to the art or craft of a potter or the manufacture of pottery. Children loved moving their hands with the potters wheel creating cups, and cooking pots. Clay is cheap and all can learn easily.



Visiting Children from Mainstream Schools



Disability is often neglected and kept aside in conversations and issue based discussion. Anjali has taken a gigantic step to spread awareness and create informed citizens by inviting

mainstream schools to send their children to visit the camp. Several schools participated in the event enthusiastically. The process involved a talk on disability by an expert,



followed by experiencing the challenges of disability, a tour of the camp and then games. 2100 children from 26 schools visited the camp this year. Students of DAV School unanimously said 'this is an important opportunity for us to meet children of our age with exceptional abilities, despite their bodily deformities.'

Children are blindfolded and asked to navigate their way through the cap. Similarly they sit on wheelchairs to



experience mobility without legs.

Mr. R.K.Sharma, rehabilitation officer of VRC, Bhubaneswar interacted every day with 300-400 children. He said "Mindset of people has to change regarding disability, for persons with disabilities to overcome hurdles and excel in various spheres of life. Anjali is the only festival that provides a platform for mushrooming of talents and comes up with new ideas for inclusion."

World famous sand artist Sudarshan Patnaik talks to Ritushree Patra about his art and his relation with Anjali.

Q: What does the sand sculpture that you have crafted in two days depict?

A: The first sculpture encompassed the message of Solidarity and Brotherhood and second on the Swachh Bharat Abhiyan. For Children's Day we have crafted a sculpture of Pt. Jawaharlal Nehru with children offering roses on it.

Q: How long have you been associated with Anjali?

A: It has been almost eight years that I have been coming to Anjali.

Q: Eight years is a long time what motivates you to come here every year?

A six year old student of mine Swayam will be performing sand animation here tomorrow. I see immense potential in him.

Sruti Mohapatra the chief coordinator of the Anjali expressed "this is our tribute to Pundit Nehru. We celebrate his deep and unconditional love for all children". The festival is meant to be a celebration of solidarity between differently abled and mainstream children; its motto "say yes to all children" perfectly embodied Chacha Nehru's commitment to embracing all

children without discrimination and his unconditional love for them.

Then all went to the stage area where a Hasya Kavita event awaited. Celebrated satirists and poets Gyana Hota, R.K.

Sharma and Sangram Keshari Swain regaled the children and their escorts with their quick wit and vyanga (satirical) poetry. Greeted by peals of laughter Gyana Hota began his piece with his characteristic declaration 'Bahut Badiya' (very good) and went on



to a running and hilarious commentary on his fellow poets. The assembled audience was unable to contain itself as each poet pulled the other's leg and related their own humorous experiences through prose. "Anjali is an attempt to bring back smiles on the faces of disabled children and we are truly blessed to have done just that" concluded R.K.Sharma. As the performance concluded the children bid them farewell with thunderous applause.



Camp Bulletins

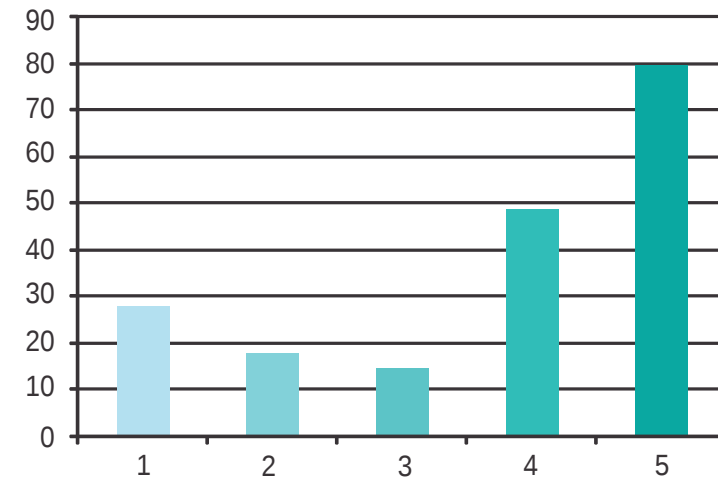


Our Anjali, the English daily newspaper and Ama Anjali, the Oriya daily newspaper are published every evening. Children and guests launch it. The newspapers carried details of activities, interviews and comments of various people in the camp and also guests. A team of students from Indian Institute of Mass Communication (IIMC) Dhenkanal conducted the activity.



Festival Audience Survey

A range of questions were asked to the participants/escorts/ guests and visitors. Relevant points are drawn out.



- First time attendees made up 28% of the festival audience.
- Regular attendees made up 18% of the festival audience.
- 15% of volunteers were second/third/or more number of times volunteers.
- For 49% of attendees, the festival exceeded their expectations.
- Using a scale from 0-10 (with 0 being extremely poor to 10 being extremely good) 80% of visitors/participants rated their festival experience 8 out of 10 or more.

Blood Grouping

On 11th November 2014 Red Cross Odisha organized blood grouping for Anjali camp participants from 9 am to 12.30pm. The activity started with teams who had registered themselves moving to the blood grouping desk, assisted by volunteers. A team of doctors and staff from Red Cross allayed children's fear of needles. After few motivating words a total of 90 children got their blood groups identified. Each child was given an ID card with their names, age, gender and blood group written in it. Many escorts requested blood grouping to be conducted every year.

"We have been providing first aid kits, generic medicines and ambulance service to the festival every year. This initiative will spread awareness among the escorts and kids about the importance of knowing their blood groups." said Gourimayee Biswal of Indian Red Cross, Bhubaneswar.

"Through this initiative we came to know that one of our students has a negative blood group. We will therefore have blood stocked for him in case of emergency." said Aadil Rashid Vaid from Human Welfare Organization of Jammu & Kashmir.

Joy Rides

Moumita Majumdar of IIMC Dhenkanal was overjoyed seeing children riding horse and camels in the camp. The joyrides at Camp Anjali were a major attraction for kids throughout the 4 day long festival. The mainstream children all ended up in this section after a tour of the camp. Sabita Sahoo of Unit VI girls high school said "I have never been on these before. I loved it. It was great to ride a camel and also to bounce off the trampoline." According

to Dr. Mohapatra, the chief coordinator of Anjali, the basic idea behind the joyrides is to encourage children for outdoor activities. For a kid coming from Jammu and Kashmir or Koraput-Malkanagiri who has never seen a camel before it was going to be a lifetime memory. Kids these days are too much into computer and video games. They need to be closer to animals and nature, she said.





First Aid

Ailment is an alien term in Anjali Festival when Dr. Bikash Prasad and Deepanjali Prasad are around. Prasad a Bhubaneswar based Homeopathy doctor and Deepanjali a nurse at Dr. Agrawal Eye Hospital Katak, have been selflessly working in Anjali for around five years. They not only look after the well being of the camp participants and the volunteers but also give them first aid lessons. If one falls sick in the camp all one needs to do is give them a call and they would be there in no time.



"All that we do is for the sake of the noble profession we are in and Sruti Madam inspires for us this. We at Anjali are planning to give junior course first aid certificates to children after they successfully complete the first aid workshop" said Prasad. "I came to know about Sruti Madam for the first time through a television programme and I came to Anjali after Bikash sir invited me to come here and serve the differently abled children." said Dipanjali.

Dillip Tirkey Game Zone

Children in the camp were hugely attracted to the giant Mickey Mouse jumping house that the game zone had. The game zone also had other attractions. Fun unlimited is what the kids desire and deserve too. Realizing the need we made available various ways of amusement in a single place called game zone.





Anand Bazar Dining Hall

Every day a group of people work around the clock to make sure that every person participating in the festival was well fed. They fed around 900 people daily, some days over 1000 that included children, escorts, volunteers, service providers, visiting school children etc. Everyday about 1 quintal rice, 40 kg lentils and 1 quintal of seasonal vegetables was consumed.



Apart from vegetarian dishes, the menu also included fish and chicken twice. Main items in the menu were rice, dal, salad, fish, chicken, vegetable fry, kheer, paneer, mushroom, papad and sweets.

Tattoo

Om Achary 30 is a tattoo artist cum game developer. He used to work as a game developer at EA ports until he realized that his real potential lies in making tattoos. He studied in Hyderabad and by the time he finished his degree he had whole knowledge of the culture and lifestyle of Hyderabad. So he decided to open a studio in Odisha so that people here could try

something purely new. He loved the spirit of differently abled people in the camp. "There is definitely some positive energy that you can actually experience here. Also we never make temporary tattoos but here it was for a special cause, so we decided to go temporary for the people in Anjali."

Dr. Satyakam, affectionately known as Raja, decided to rebuild his shattered life and faith saw him through. Lying on his bed paralysed in three limbs, he started drawing with his left hand. He has now made sketches in pencil and charcoal of over a hundred famous

people including Mahatma Gandhi, Mother Teresa, Rabindranath Tagore, Abraham Lincoln, Einstein and many others. He gave digital copies of his sketches to Swabhiman. They were printed, framed and given as gifts to all guests.

Dr. Satyakam Das



Satyakam Das was about three and a half years old when he moved to Ranchi along with his parents after his father Dr. R.N.Das got an appointment as a medicine specialist in Ispat Hospital, Ranchi. Satyakam completed his +2 in

DAV School Ranchi. While in school he excelled in every activity and ultimately became topper in 10th and did +2 examinations. He was adjudged the Head boy of the school in 1993. Out of his extracurricular activities the

one that was appreciated most was the skill of drawing and paintings. From a very early age he developed a fascination for this and matching to his age he was outstanding while drawing those lines. Being a topper in academics he preferred to study medicine and got admitted in S.C.B.Medical College Cuttack in 1995. Subsequently he competed for prestigious Armed Forces Medical College, Pune and got selected. While studying MBBS at Pune he was equally involved in his paintings too. He made logos for couple of Medical Journals in India. Few of his sketches are still being displayed in the gallery of Armed Forces Medical College. After passing out MBBS he joined Army as a permanent Commissioned officer in the rank of Captain in 2000. While on duty his car collided head on with a truck near Ahmedabad and the hell broke loose. He was subsequently admitted to Military Hospital, Ahmedabad and followed by Command Hospital, Pune, Naval Hospital, Mumbai and finally Army Hospital, Delhi.

After exactly two years of hospitalization and having undergone multiple reconstructive surgeries he was ultimately left with a complete right side paralysis and was subsequently invalidated out of Army service on 14.05.2006.

He was engrossed on the computer for 4 years and then he started to pick up pen and pencil in his left hand just to try something. Over the last four years he has been sketching out mostly the famous personalities, which is being appreciated by one and all. And now his sketches have been set at 13th Anjali National Children Festival for children to get impetus to do something.



Sonu Tiger

Polio has long got overshadowed by the speed of his dance moves. After doing ramp shows for two years Sonu Tiger came in contact with various



choreographers and they advised him to dance. With every performance he gained more and more confidence. He has done many shows in Punjab, which has made him popular there. Buoyed by their response he thought of participating in reality shows. He made it to India's Got Talent, Entertainment Ke Liye Kuch Bhi Karega, Dance India



Dance and other shows. He has also won a local competition Spice Talent Khoj.

His aim is to become an actor. Dance is a sort of stepping stone for him to reach out to the main stream Bollywood industry. He has worked in few Punjabi films like Sajana and working on an upcoming movie Punjabi Munde.

"When Sruti Ma'am asked me to perform again I felt like I have become a hero. She was so kind that she recommended me to a dance academy and also invited me for a dinner."

Raj Kumar

From Telangana, this 14 year old boy lost his forearms in an accident in 2010 but his upper arms moves swiftly and effortlessly across the canvas and he is apt at creating stunning images of nature as well as portraits.

Raj Kumar is not only a fine painter but is equally good in studies. Having lost his father at a tender age Kumar's only inspiration in life is his mother who is



highly supportive of his career. He wants to become a software engineer.

Kumar says he never felt that he is handicapped. "I help my mother in the household chores and also assist my siblings in completing their homework. I am not going to limit my life for my missing arms." said an optimistic Kumar who is currently studying in Class IX. He has been painting since he was four years old and has grabbed a number of awards at the state and national level for his painting abilities.

Ashok Kumar

He hails from Gwalior and won many hearts at Anjali. He is affected by cerebral palsy but that does not affect the 15 year old lad's communication skills. He gets along well with everyone and has already made a lot of friends at the camp. Ashok is very good at memorizing things and is an expert at providing first aid. "He is very compassionate and knows the right



skills to nurse people. He is well versed with the right procedures and knows how to apply bandage to a cut." said his caregiver Vivek Sharma.

Ashok wants to take professional training in nursing. "When I see someone in pain I feel bad. If given a chance I would like to become a nurse in the future." said the young lad.

Swayam Sakhyam



Swayam Sakhyam, child sand animator and sculptor at the age of six has performed in national level talent show at the Life OK's child television talent show "Hindusthan Ke Hunarbaaz". Swayam, is a student of Sudarsan Sand Art institute. Swayam has been learning sand art for the last 5 years under Sudarsan Patnaik's able guidance. Dr. Sruti Mohapatra

Chief Coordinator



Sitting in her wheelchair, fighting for the rights and dignity of the disabled, 51-year-old Dr Sruti Mohapatra has emerged as the perfect role model for the physically and mentally challenged in India. Sruti has initiated a process

that clearly focuses on the rights and capabilities, a major shift from the hitherto fatalistic and charitable attitude that the state authority, officials, and people in general harbour towards such people.

A road accident fractured her spinal cord when young Sruti had just qualified for Indian Civil Services. She lost everything in one fraction of a second. A fighter, she jumped back to life and today is a disability activist by passion and mission. Gold medalist and topper in both graduation and post graduation, three times national debating champion, state basketball team member, she is the first in South Asia to complete a Ph.D. on wheelchair. Her first book is ECHOES, a collection of poetry published by

Writer's Workshop, Kolkata. Has authored two books 'Disability Etiquette', 'Laws for the Disabled', edited a book on 'Concessions and Facilities For the Disabled' and is the Editor of 'Blue File - a compilation of newspaper clippings on various facets of disability.' She has published about 100 articles on disability issues and topics of general interest.

Sruti has won several awards for her exemplary life and work. Some are CNN-IBN Real Hero, Sarala Samman, Citizen of the year, Shatabdi Ra samman etc.





Dr. Sruti Mohapatra

Chief Coordinator Anjali National Children's Festival talks to Pragya Bhatnagar from IIMC Dhenkanal about her experience with Anjali.

Q: What motivated you to start a national children's festival?

A: During my visits to various foreign countries I noticed that disabled children were given special provisions to uplift them to match up with the society. This experience gave me impetus and I started working for the welfare of disabled people. Initially the festival was started for disabled children only but later seeing the interest of many school students who volunteered for the camp, I thought of making it open for all children. We wanted to make it a joyful experience where children can not only enjoy but also learn and spread happiness all around.

Q: Why Solidarity and Brotherhood theme this years?

A: Since UN this year adopted the theme solidarity and brotherhood we also decided to have this as our theme. The idea was to voice our idea of solidarity and brotherhood against the noise of violence and protests that has gripped the entire globe.

Q: What does Anjali Festival signify?

A: Anjali festival is about accepting differences and celebrating diversity. The main motive of Anjali festival is to spread happiness and create a joyful learning experience for children.

Q- Do you keep track of the students who have been to Anjali?

A: It is not entirely feasible to keep track of all the students since they are huge in number but yet the exceptionally talented ones are kept track of we have helped many of our students with our scholarship and many of them are now at good places in their lives. There was one boy, Purna, whom we identified in Anjali, gave him scholarship and now he is a teacher in Kendriya Vidyalaya. Another boy is now a government employee. So these kinds of talented students we do keep a record of and help them in every manner we can.

Q: Where do you see Anjali in coming years?

A: I want to see Anjali to grow into a major program just like the National Youth Program that the Government of India now runs. It can be done on the PPP mode. We want to see Anjali recognized as the platform for all children, sans all barriers, from across the nation as well as the globe.

Pre-Festival Activities

Every day the office staff and some volunteers used to go to the ground to survey its progress and developments.

In the week preceding Anjali the working hour started at 9AM and extended till the days work was completed. Sruti Madam's mother Dr. Annapurna Devi served all with delicious meals and snacks.

We put in all our little efforts and left no stone unturned to fulfill our share of duties and responsibilities as

volunteers. With whole hearted cooperation and courage every one of us looked forward with eager eyes to

make ANJALI a grand success. And thus, together we made a difference.

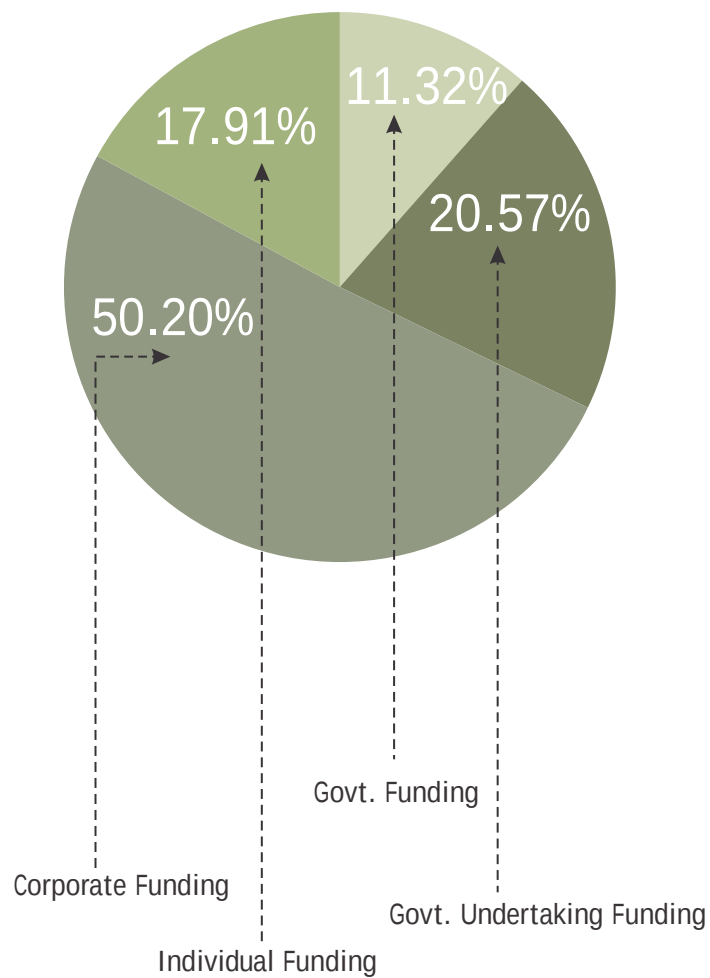

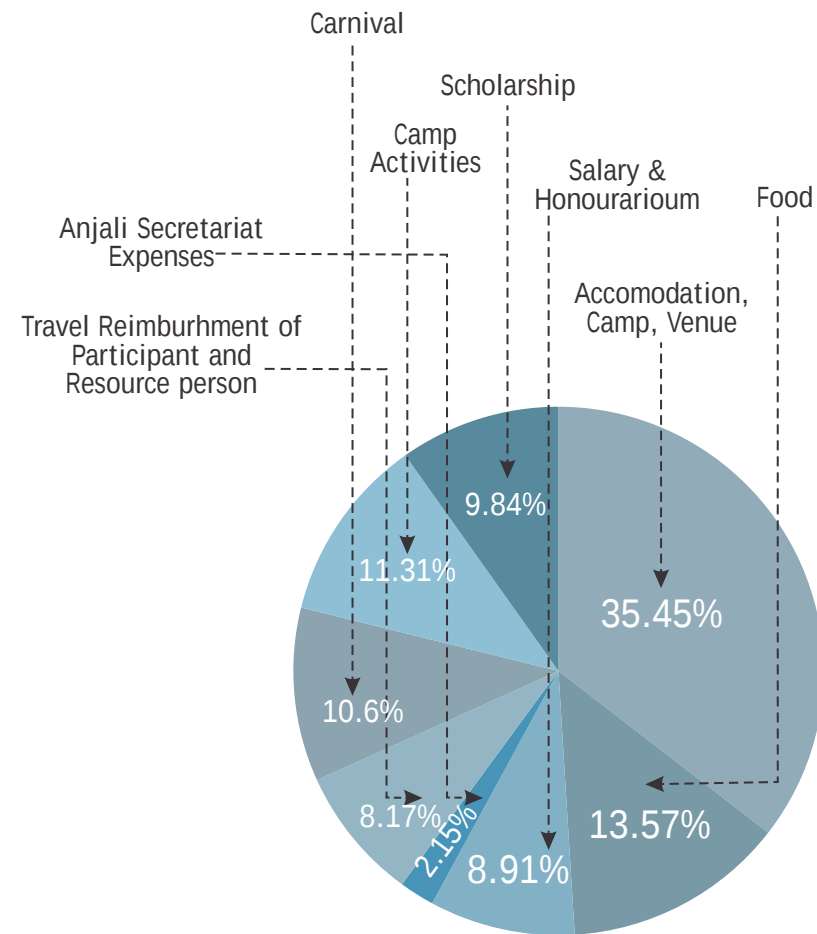
